Religious Education

In Religion, Year Four students have undertaken an inquiry using the driving question 'How do we live, love and learn'. So far students have defined the key words in the driving question and have explored how different positive role models in their lives and around the world live, love and learn. As a class, students have defined a role model as:

An individual whose behaviour influences others to also act in a positive way

To deepen our understanding students explored how significant individuals in their lives and in the world around us fit this criteria. Upon further inquiry students identified Mrs Fortini, Father Andrew, Nelson Mandela, Greta Thunberg, Mary Mackillop and Malala Yousafzai as individuals who inspire others to make a difference in the world around them and act in a positive way.



As we enter the Lenten Season students are now beginning to explore how the person of Jesus Christ is a positive role model based on Scripture passages and relating his actions back to the driving question. To commence this line of inquiry, students were invited on a scavenger hunt by the one and only Gingerbread Boy. Upon reading the book as a class, the Gingerbread Boy left clues around the school.

These clues resulted in a message that students needed to decipher. The revealed message was a Scripture Quote from John 14:6 where Jesus reveals to his Disciples that he is "the way, the truth and the life". Over the next few weeks students will continue to deepen their understanding as to how Jesus is a positive role model and aspire to be like him and act in service for others.
















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From The Principal

Mosquitoes at School

No aerosol cans are allowed on school grounds.














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
Events at School



Thank you to all the parents who availed themselves to attend last week's Student Led Conferences. It was wonderful to welcome back parents onto school grounds so that the students could share their learning and their understanding of the Learning Disposition Wheel and how they can use these competencies to engage more deeply with their learning.

The Learning Disposition Wheel is research based and underpins everyone's capability to learn. The staff have been extending their own professional learning about these learning dispositions and how they can embed this into their teaching and learning, providing practical experiences for students to be immersed in and reflect upon their learning. We believe student understanding will continue to develop as we proceed throughout the year.













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Two activities occurring this week are a mufti-day on Friday as well as the school Cross Country. As both these activities occur on the same day I ask parents to make sure their children are dressed appropriately so that they can participate in the school Cross Country. All students are to wear their sports shoes and clothes that they can easily run in. Parents of students Years 3-6 are invited to attend the Cross Country beginning at 9:30am. Harassment and Bullying



As part of our ongoing efforts to broaden student knowledge and understanding of the serious implications around the issue of Bullying and Harassment Stage 3 students welcomed Senior Constable Shane Summersford, Youth Liaison Officer, Cumberland Police Area Command.

Senior Constable Summersford outlined clearly that the acts of bullying and harassment were extremely serious and a criminal act according to the law. The students engaged whole heartedly in the presentation clearly articulating their understanding of these issues.

Next week the school continues its efforts in raising student awareness with impact speaker Luke S Kennedy sharing his story with Stage 2 & 3 students. Luke will cover topics including Bullying (self-bullying/ negative self talk), resilience, how to be yourself & stop worrying what people think, mental health and self care.

These presentations are in conjunction with the school's PBS4L program that is taught daily in each classroom across the school.

Close and household contacts:

Please read and make sure you understand how this impacts on your family if someone in the household tests positive for COVID-19

- A close contact notified by an authorised contact tracer must self-isolate for 7 days.
- A household contact must self isolate for 7 days commencing from when the diagnosed person took the test (note, in practice this could end up being less than 7 days if the diagnosed person took a PCR test and it took a couple of days to get a positive result). This is a change from the previous order where the 7 days is counted from the time the person was last in contact with the diagnosed case.
- A household contact is not obligated to self-isolate as a contact more than once in a 21 day period (if that person is
 diagnosed with COVID-19, they will need to self-isolate as COVID positive).














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- A household contact is not obligated to self isolate as a contact if they have already completed their self-isolation period
 and are subsequently notified by another household contact, and it has been no more than 14 days since the initial period.
- A close contact or household contact is not required to self-isolate as a contact if the person previously had COVID-19 and
 it has been less than 8 weeks since the person ceased self-isolating as a case (this has increased from 28 days)














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Attendance Targets




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Holy Family Granville is now offering an online payment service through Qkr Application!


